

Saskatchewan Deer

How many species of deer are there in SK?

In Saskatchewan, there are elk, moose, caribou, white-tail deer, and mule deer in the deer family. Deer species live in specific habitats across the globe and are highly adapted to their local environments.

When do deer give birth?

Deer mate from mid October through mid November. A baby deer is called a fawn. Fawns are usually born in April – July. Baby deer (fawns) typically stay with their mother for about one year.

Where do deer live?

Deer live on farms, in the forest, river valleys and wetlands, provincial parks, and Cypress Hills.

Why are deer important?

Deer are important because they give you food. People use deer for steak, roast beef, clothing, and tools.

What is the size of an average deer?

Average male 150 – 300 lbs.

Female 90 – 200 lbs.

The largest species is the moose.

What is the lifespan of a deer?

They have lived for 3 – 6 years.

What do deer need to survive?

Deer need a consistent, year-round habitat providing food, water, and cover (shelter) to survive.

- White tailed deer raise their tail to warn other deer of danger
